1. PROJECT NARRATIVE

a. Project Description:

For many years, the Beverly Parks & Recreation Commission has been discussing the possibility of creating better access to the beach and water at Dane Street Beach. There is a parking lot with HP parking and a paved path to a concrete ramp that leads to the beach at a point closest to the HP parking. Even though people in wheelchairs can get to the beach, it is not possible for them to move across the sand to get near or into the water.

Installing a section of ADA accessible mats and providing ADA beach chairs, both motorized and manual, will enable people with disabilities to move across the sand to get to the water. We are hoping to also have floating chairs that will enable people to go right into the water and cool off.

There are several brands of beach chairs and accessible mats available and we would like to provide at least one motorized and one manual-push chair (preferably floating chair) for users of the beach during the summer season. The chairs will be made available each day and then stored in the locked bathhouse each evening by the lifeguards on duty.

b. CPA Eligibility, Community Preservation Need:

The project will conform to the Community Preservation Fund allowable spending purposes (G.L. c. 44B, § 5) as being Recreational Land, with active and passive recreational use as a park and beach. We will be creating new pathways to and across the beach and providing new ADA beach chairs to enhance accessibility, which will greatly enhance the recreational opportunities for people of all ages with disabilities.

Lyons Park/Dane Street Beach is the largest public beach in Beverly and one of the most popular public beach destinations for families in Beverly and all over the North Shore. Many families and youth groups from Lynn and Salem come to Lyons Park to picnic and to enjoy the beach during the summer months. Having these new amenities will allow more people with disabilities to come to this beach and enjoy full access.

c. Project Partnerships & Support

A number of Beverly groups support the project outlined in this proposal, and will work collaboratively. Please find letters of support from:

The Beverly Recreation Department will be submitting a request to SMILE Mass to possibly fund some of the cost of the ADA beach chairs and pathways. SMILE Mass has funded a number of waterfront facilities with chairs and ADA improvements over the past several years.

d. Feasibility:

This project has been discussed at several Commission on Disabilities' meetings over the past year. The Commission is unanimous in its support for this project and willing to commit funding to help support this initiative.

As the Parks, Recreation and Community Services Director for the City of Beverly, the Commission on Disabilities is one of the groups I oversee. I have worked with the SMILE Mass organization in the past and I am very committed to making the beaches under the jurisdiction of the Beverly Recreation Department as accessible as possible. Adding accessible paths and ADA beach chairs will greatly enhance the accessibility at Dane Street Beach.

e. Applicant/Organization Background:

The Beverly Recreation Department is responsible for providing a diverse range of recreational opportunities to the residents of Beverly as well as many non-residents. We are dedicated to providing active and passive recreation through the use and enjoyment of the city's extensive natural land, parks and coastal resources. We develop, promote and oversee year-round programs and activities to stimulate good health, lifelong learning and a sense of community among our citizens and nonresident visitors. Beverly Recreation is dedicated to meeting the diverse needs of all ages of its residents, including the preservation and maintenance of open space.

The Beverly Recreation Department has been involved in many projects over the past 15 years, including the ongoing renovation of the Carriage House at Lynch Park, creation of the Paddles' Park Dog Park, reconstruction of the bathhouse at Obear Park, numerous field renovations and playground construction projects throughout Beverly. By working with the Department of Public Services, private vendors and contractors and City Hall, we have been able to complete many projects in a timely manner and within budget.

This project has the full support of Mayor Cahill's office, the Beverly Parks & Recreation Commission and many other city officials and citizens of Beverly.

f. Maintenance & Long Term Preservation:

Once installed, the City of Beverly Department of Public Services and the Beverly Recreation Department will maintain this pathway and the ADA beach chairs. The DPS maintains all grounds and equipment, including motorized vehicles. If repairs are needed for the paths or chairs, they will be available for this maintenance.






In addition, the Commission on Disabilities unanimously voted to initiate this request as part of their mission to insure that municipal services and programs are available and accessible to persons with disabilities.

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




